### Recipe for the Month

Tomatoes are still plentiful in the gardens and the farmers' market.

### Miss Emily's Green Tomato Soup

1 medium onion, diced
1/3 cup carrots, diced
2 cloves garlic, minced
6 cups fresh green tomatoes, cored and chopped
2 cups chicken broth/bouillon
Salt and pepper to taste
4 slices bacon
1/3 cup sour cream

Directions: Cook bacon in deep pan until crisp. Remove and place on paper towel lined plate. In bacon grease, cook onion and carrots until soft. Add garlic and sauté for 3 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, broth, salt and pepper. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer 30 minutes. Using a food processor or blender, puree soup until smooth. Return to pan and add sour cream, cooking until combined. Garnish with crumbled bacon.
