#### My Favorite Plant: Patricia Patty



Oriental poppies

One of my favorite flowers is the Oriental Poppy. They "pop up" wherever they feel like it, and always complement whatever else happens to be there. Later in the summer when the seed heads dry out, the Goldfinches, being about the only local bird to feed their young seeds instead of bugs, will peck holes in the pod to get to the tiny seeds.

Poppies only bloom a short while before the weather heats up. Seeds must endure a period of cold and usually start germination in January.

#### June's Garden Tip

In Alabama it is feast or famine. It either rains every day and our plants get fungus and disease or we have high temperatures and drought and plants wilt. We have to adjust on a daily basis on whatever conditions come our way. I often see irrigation systems running when there has been ample rain.

Make certain when you water to allow plants to dry before nightfall as one way to prevent plant problems.

Scout your vegetable gardens on a daily basis to take care of any problems sooner than later.

Any shrubs or trees added this past spring will need careful monitoring during summer's hot and dry days. Moisture and good drainage are essential to a plant's life.
