#### President's Message

Well, it's May and for now that means it's going to look a lot like April - physical distancing, socially connecting via electronic means, masks to protect yourself and others as well, no group gatherings in small enclosed spaces, and limited trips to town for groceries and essential items. Hopefully, everyone has planted their gardens by now – either in the ground, in containers, in straw bales or raised beds. I know I have probably planted way too much again but for now I have the time, right? Well that also means more weeding, more thinning, more pest management, more watering, more of everything --- maybe I should rethink the expansion of my garden with blueberry plants, blackberry trellises, and a few other ideas that come into my idle mind. I am always amazed at how planning the garden, working the soil, and even the planting and caring for it all is really therapy for other stressors in life. Sometimes I just lean on the fence and think how fortunate I am to be outside, being a steward of the land and animals on the farm and seeing the beauty of our world right in front of me!! So for now, y'all take care, be safe and keep washing yo' dirty hands!!

#### May recipe from Linda McDaniel



Linda has brought this soup to our meetings and folks have really praised it.

#### **Cheeseburger Soup**

Ingredients 1 lb. Ground Beef 4 Tablespoons Butter <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Cup Chopped Onions <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Cup Shredded Carrots 1 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lb. Potatoes (about 4) Peeled and Cubed 3 Cups Chicken Broth <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Cup Corn Starch 1 lb. Velveeta Process Cheese – 1 inch cubes 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Cups Whole Milk <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Teaspoon Salt <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Cup Sour Cream

#### Directions

• Cook and crumble ground beef until no longer pink, drain and set aside

• Add butter, potatoes, onions, carrots and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to a simmer and cover. Cook until potatoes are tender (about 15 to 20 minutes).

- Add ground beef, broth and bring to a boil.
- Mix corn starch with a little water. Add to soup.
- Reduce heat to low and stir in cheese, milk, salt and pepper. Cook until cheese has melted.
- Remove from heat, blend in sour cream and serve.


