President's Year End Message

2020 is about over! I don't know whether to celebrate or cry...it's been a rough and tough year in many ways but also a return to simpler times for some, a chance to focus on the things that matter the most and a year to remember in more ways than I can count. But here's the wrap up of information that every Master Gardener needs to read, know, and take actions as required:

1. Dues are due for all Active Master Gardeners. \$20 for annual dues (10 for County, 10 for State). There are other options, too many to cover here so ask if you have questions.

2. Hours are due as well. All MG hours are to be recorded online by every MG in an active status. This year AMGA authorized webinars, recorded or live, to be counted for your 25 volunteer hours (so if you have 35 CEUs you are good to go). Remember every year an active MG must have a minimum of 25 volunteer hours plus 10 CEUs. 3. Resolutions will be up for membership vote at November meeting. Here's the summary of those resolutions handed out at last meeting: a. Change in policy and bylaws to reflect moving to Standard Calendar Year (Jan-Dec) for all areas (finances, hours, awards, elections, etc.).

b. Change in policy for interns and awarding of name badges, t shirts, and recognition. Provisional Master Gardener will designate all interns that achieve their required 50 volunteer hours, immediately upon this achievement. At this point, they will be allowed to wear name badges, t shirts, etc; but until they have actively paid dues, they will be provisional without full benefits of voting, serving on committees, etc.

c. Change in election of Executive Board. Even and Odd year elections such that the Board will evenly turnover annually to provide greater continuity and consistency. This will begin in November 2021, post conference completion and financial records settlement. COVID numbers are going up so Holiday Awards Banquet is not going to happen, shouldn't surprise anyone; but we are looking for a way to recognize the new class and others, stay tuned to weekly emails as we may have a short awards meeting on our regular 2nd Wednesday in December.

Lastly, as we end this year and begin the next, we must actively focus on the upcoming Conference in April 2021. We need all Active Master Gardeners to participate in committee planning, attend the event, and work each day to make this State Conference a success for AMGA and Calhoun County!!! Every single person will be needed to accomplish this huge task. There is a task for each and every one of us, each and every day of the Conference, so be ready to step up, volunteer and help out -- we simply cannot do it without YOU!!! See y'all at the Creek!

Recipe of the Month: Rice Casserole

Recipe submitted by Linda Kaylor (a member of the 2020 intern class) This recipe is a family favorite - because it is so very easy and delicious!

Rice Casserole 1 cup long grain rice 1 can French onion soup 1 can beef broth 1 stick butter, cut in pieces

Spray a 2-quart casserole dish with cooking spray. To make a double recipe I use a 9 x13 casserole dish. Put rice in dish and add soup. Stir to combine. Drop butter pieces on top. Cover with aluminum foil and bake for 1 hour at 400 degrees.

Garden Giggle

"When weeding, the best way to make sure you are removing a weed and not a valuable plant is to pull on it. If it comes out of the ground easily, it is a valuable plant."

Gardening Tip

Beware the mulberry weed (Fatoua villosa). This nonnative invasive weed (from Asia) reproduces by seeds which can scatter near and far. It reproduces rapidly in flower beds and in container plantings from nurseries.

Mowing it will scatter the seeds which can still germinate. If happy and not removed, it can reach two feet. The best form of removal is manually, making sure to get rid of roots and crown. Do not compost. Since the seeds need light to germinate, mulch can help stifle it unless it gets on top of the mulch in which case mulch cannot help.

Mulberry weed, which looks a lot like a mulberry tree, will keep a gardener very busy.
