## Message from the President By Sheila Anne Webb

We'll wrap up 2017 with several special events. See Sherry Blanton's column in newsletter interior for specific dates and times. Please help us celebrate the dedication of the green house at the November meeting. The process will be similar to the dedication we had for the Coke Williams building. If you're bringing food to share, please arrive and place your food by 11:45 a.m. so we may begin promptly at noon. Don't forget to bring a serving utensil. Someone will be available to help you place your food gift. No need for any desserts; a special cake has been ordered. The agenda will be as follows:

- 1. Everyone should assemble inside by noon. MGs and interns should sign in as usual.
- 2. At noon, I'll offer a welcome and start with the pledge to the flag.
- 3. Next, we'll have our traditional Gardener's moment of reflection/silence.
- 4. I'll explain we're taking a vote on new officers now because some MGs may not attend the business meeting which follows the dedication. Only MGs can vote.
- 5. The food will be blessed and Dick Pritchett and guests will lead off the luncheon line.
- 6. During lunch, I'll call on Dick to introduce his guests.
- 7. I'll call for comments on the Pritchett family or greenhouse for Sherron.
- 8. At the closure of lunch, I'll announce our MG business meeting following the dedication. The business meeting involves payment of annual dues and posting volunteer hours for the period Nov. 1, 2016 to Oct. 31, 2017. Assistance will be available for these processes.
- 9. David West will be introduced. He will lead us to the greenhouse and conduct the dedication.

December is also a busy time with preparation for and our annual Awards banquet. Interns receive their certificates for having completed all requirements, thus officially (now that hours were posted and dues paid) becoming Master Gardeners. The Red Bandanna will also be awarded. David West will cook the meat and members provide a potluck for the banquet. The building will be decorated and we'll play Dirty Santa for those who wish to contribute a \$10 gift. As our year of activities are closing down, let's not forget our flora and fauna. If you've planted new trees or shrubs from a nursery, you'll want to wean them off daily watering to a more spaced out program ultimately letting Mother Nature take over. Several techniques work: 1st week imitate the nursery by watering daily, 2nd every other day, thereafter 1-3 times weekly depending on soil needs. When the ground freezes, stop watering and let Mother Nature take over until spring. For watering, measure the diameter of the trunk 6" from the ground. For each inch in diameter, use 1-2 gallons of water. Test soil moisture with your finger tip. Use a garden hose with a slow trickle for 15- 20 minutes. Some like slow water release bags. Or, simply drill two 1/4 inch holes in the same bottom side of a 5-gallon bucket. Place the bucket holes on the mulch next to the trunk to maximize water reaching the root ball.

I hope you've enjoyed watching the birds flock and have begun to see migrations pass through. I always try to spot raptors who may have a long flight to Argentina, for example. There's a chance to see them with the foothills here where they can catch thermal drafts which they like. This year I joyfully watched 3 dozen plus Canadian geese practice leadership and grouping patterns in a pond for about 2 weeks prior to their departure.

Fall colors are just beginning as I write this. Hope it's beautiful and that you enjoy the cooler weather, breezes (which, when I was a child, smelled of burning leaves) and nature's color parade. Looking forward to seeing you at year end events.

# Gardening Tips for November and December

- Keep the lawn raked of leaves and straw. Straw is a great mulch; leaves work well as a mulch and also in the compost pile.
- Remove spent perennials, leftover summer annuals, and any other plants that expired over the summer and early fall.
- Begin a compost pile.
- Do a soil test for your landscape if you have not performed one in the last two years. Fall is a great time to add lime, if your soil requires it (according to the recommendations of the soil test).
- Continue planting pansies and other cool season annuals in November.

- Begin planting spring blooming bulbs as soon as the first frost and the soil and air have cooled down. Bulbs planted too early will begin to sprout if the temperatures are too warm.
- · Keep bird feeders and baths clean and full.
- If we do not have ample rain, keep an eye on the moisture level of recently planted ornamental shrubs and trees and supplement as needed.
- The best time to plant in our area is now in full swing. Nurseries are stocked with plants to add to the garden. Keep them watered as needed. Mulch the garden for the oncoming winter weather.
- Tender houseplants should be inside for the winter months.
- Clean and store lawn equipment.
- Disconnect and store hoses. Protect outside faucets from the freezing temperatures ahead.
