Ingredients:

3 cups sweet potatoes

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup brown sugar

½ cup milk

2 eggs, lightly beaten

1 cup melted butter

Topping:

½ cup brown sugar

1/3 cup melted butter

1/3 cup flour

1 cup chopped pecans

Directions:

Combine first 6 ingredients. Pour into buttered casserole dish. Mix remaining ingredients together and sprinkle over top. Bake 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes until hot and brown.
