CHILTON COUNTY MASTER GARDENERS ASSOCIATION Meeting minutes February 11, 2014

After the Awards were given out and pictures were taken we drew for three more door prizes. The winners were Mildred Knowles, Steve McAnally and Bonnie Hairrell.

Pat Farmer introduced our Speaker for the day, Randy Tipton. He did a program on Steam Kill Weeds the Green Way. This is a service provided by ACTION ENVIRONMENTAL GREEN INITIATIVE SERVICES (AEGIS) a relative new business and way of weed control. The SteamKill is an alternative way of killing and eradicating bugs and weeds without using chemicals. He had the SteamKill machine set up outside for anyone to look at and ask questions about. It has been good for killing invasive weeds in many of the experiments that have been conducted at Birmingham Botanical Gardens and Aldridge Gardens. This is not for the home yard as it will kill the grasses along with the weeds. The machine is not selective as it kills anything under the steam spray both on top of the ground and the root system under ground. It is also used to sterilize soils. It is a very mobile machine with two applicators, each on a separate 100 foot hose. They have used it to treat soil for nematodes, ground pearl infestations and even fire ant mounds. The hoses are connected to a nearby water faucet or can be connected to a portable water tank. It does not work well on climbing vines because it has to be capped over the plant to work properly. It can be used to do organic cleaning. These include cleaning old chewing gum off concrete, stadium seats, patios and many other cleaning problems. He gave a slide presentation showing the effects of SteamKill and what a good job it does. The advantages of SteamKill shown in his brochure are no chemical residue, can be used on windy days without drifts into unwanted areas and rain will not wash away the treatment, environmentally and earth friendly, not harmful to soil or ground water, weeds and pest will not build up resistance, no worries about human or pet exposure, treated areas are safe for children and pets immediately and it does not harm the food chain.
