## Chilton County Master Gardeners Association Meeting Minutes November 12, 2019

Susan Cleckler, President, opened our meeting at 9:30 AM.

Larry Jones led us in a moment of silence then we recited the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag.

Susan welcomed everyone, members and guests, to our meeting.

There were no corrections or additions to our minutes. They were approved as posted on our website.

Audrey Giles, Treasurer, read our financial report. Beginning balance was \$15,888.95. After transactions during the month were added and taken off the ending balance on October 31, 2019 is \$15, 878.21. There being no questions the report was approved as read.

President, Susan Cleckler, introduced our speaker and program for the day, Dr. Charles Mitchell "The Camellia, Celebrating the State Flower of Alabama". Dr. Mitchell retired in 2016 from the Department of Crop, Soil and Environmental Science at Auburn. He also served 32 years as a Soil Specialist working with County Agents. He grew up in Marengo County, AL on a cattle and cotton farm. Today he is very active in the Auburn-Opelika Men's Camellia Club. He introduced his wife, Peggy, who is a Lee County Master Gardener. This is the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary for the Camellia as our State Flower. He reported that the Camellias pretty much takes care of themselves. They were brought into Alabama in the early 1800's about the same time Alabama became a state. There are approximately 20,000 varieties of the Camellia. The Camellia japonica is the most widely grown as an ornamental plant and makes a great hedge. The Camellia sinensis is an important species because it is known as the common tea plant. Dried leaves makes black tea and fresh leaves makes green tea. The Camellia sasangua is another widely grown species. The Camellia oliferia variety is grown for the seed oil. This oil is used in several cosmetic products. He discussed the many ways you can propagate this plant such as grafting, air layering, root cuttings and from sowing the seeds. The months of November and March are the best months to plant Camellias and plant them in semi- sun/shade. There is no fragrance in the blooms but there are many different type of blooms. They are single, double, solid and variegated blooms as well as all different sizes. Plant them high on the soil and make sure you keep them watered good for at least the first two years because the root system is very shallow. He had many varieties on hand to show making this a very interesting and informative program.

Alice Broome, Nominating Committee Chairperson, nominated the following people to fill our offices for the 2020 year from the committee. President – Susan Cleckler; Vice-President – Charla Doucet; Secretary – Elizabeth York and Treasurer - Audrey Giles. She asked for other nominations from the floor. There were none.
