- Pat Farmer, President, called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m.
- Pat Farmer welcomed members, interns and guests. Pat recognized July

- Jerry Farmer led us in the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag.
- June Meeting Minutes given by Treasia Bennett with highlights of June meeting held at Petal from the Past. The program was on Herbs presented by Betsy Smith. We heard from project leads, report on AMGA grant received for 2021, and discussed Gay West's retirement gift. No additions or changes were made. Minutes accepted as posted on CCMG website.
- **Treasurer Report** given by Pat Farmer. Audrey Giles still not feeling well. Beginning balance \$10,033.28 + \$00.00 deposits \$205.26 cleared and uncleared checks and payments = \$9,828.02 Ending Balance.
- Pat Farmer introduced speaker, Anthony Yarborough, Autauga County Master Gardner since 2009. ٠ Program on Destructive Garden Insects. Autauga is hosting fall seminar on September 30,2021. If you wish to identify an insect, take a picture and send to him. Anthony has thirteen hours of course study in Entomology and Row Crop Farming at Auburn University. Insects are a dominant group and have ruled the earth. There are greater than one million species. Humans have aided in proliferation of insects with Colorado potato bug, fire ants, alfalfa weevil, etc. Insects can be beneficial and destructive. Destructive insects are aphids, get into flour, and can spread diseases like mosquitoes and flies. Beneficial insect are bugs on the water that feed the fish, etc. the metamorphosis can be complete or incomplete. Complete metamorphosis has four stages: egg, larva, pupae and adult such as flies, butterflies, wasps, and ants. Incomplete metamorphosis has three stages: egg, nymph and adult such stink bug, aphids, grasshopper and cockroaches. There are two types of insect feedings. Chewing is small holes on leaves such as a beetle. Piercing/sucking is where juice is sucked out of leaves like a stink bug. Controlling insects can be done by keeping plants health, have soil sampled, keep garden weed free, using pesticides, picking off insects from plants and planting companion plants. A good documentary on Netflix, "Kiss the Ground" advocates if enough can change agricultural practice, we can control global warming.
- Gay West's retirement gift Pat Farmer. Membership voted to donate the proceeds to 4-H in Gay's honor.
- Demo Garden by Pat Farmer, Trisha Williams and Sharon Hosch The committee need ideas on how to make it a teaching garden again. The purpose of the demo garden is for its usefulness, teaching, lunchn-learn, and perhaps self-guided tours. Please let Sharon Hosch know of any ideas. The workdays are now on Tuesday or Wednesday. Normally work from 8-10 but can begin work at 7:00 before it gets so hot. Please help whenever you can. If you do not know if weed or plant, please ask.
- Extension Garden by Gail Brooks This project needs some help in weeding, pruning and getting the gardens in good order. The group works each Monday from 8-10.
- Plant Dig by Harriett Jackson & Rick Miller First dig used all gallon pots. It is a wonderland of roses, day lilies, iris and more. Volunteers are digging and potting plants to grow off for a plant sale. Dig and pot each Thursday in July beginning at 7:00 am. Volunteers may keep 20% of the plants for their own personal use. - Seed Saving by Trisha Williams for Rae Ann Wright Time to start saving seeds from summer vegetables such as squash, tomatoes, corn etc. Dry the seeds, place in envelopes and label for packaging and distributing next spring gardening.
