PROGRAM – Gail Brooks presented Edible Landscaping by Debbie Boutelier, Master Gardener from Autauga County. First edible landscape garden was the Garden of Eden of edible fruits. There are several types of edible gardens:

Monastery Gardens – grown for food and medicine.

Kitchen Gardens – grow food to eat usually at back door.

Victory Gardens WWII – Grow food to send to soldiers. 40% of nation's vegetables were grown at that time.

Lawns became a symbol of wealth and decorative. The current trend, the lot sizes smaller and/or reduced size of lawns.

Some impacts in gardening are food scares such as e-coli, listeria, GMO's, organic vs conventional, and supply chain issues. However, gardening is not without problems such as neighbors' perception, HOA's, unlawful by who's standards and not traditional landscaping.

Some benefits of edible landscaping are growing medicinal, food, health, and not in stores. You can make gardens pretty if in front yard and maintain neighborhood aesthetics. Herbs and vegetables can be integrated with plants and shrubs. Back yard gardening is more private for growing vegetables and herbs while kept neat with raised beds, vertical plantings, and pots. 50% of vegetables can be grown in a 4' x 10' area. Design principals can be integrated with structure, form, repetition, texture, pleasing in form such as leggy tomatoes or bush tomatoes (indeterminate vs determinate), leaves remain healthy. Screens, fences, and trellises can be used in gardening. How to choose? Select something you like to eat, what plant/tree looks like, matured size and maintenance.
