## CCMGA monthly meeting April 8, 2025

Clem Clapp led us in the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag.

President Skip Coulter welcomed everyone to our meeting. He recognized Hugh Nichols who introduced our speaker and program for today.

Dr. Chip East is a Regional Extension Agent. He grew up working on his uncle's vegetable, cattle, and hog farm as well as a nursery and landscaping business. The native azalea became his favorite plant to propagate. He gave us a very in depth program on the many ways you can propagate an azalea. He stated the native azalea is the hardest to root. He explained the many ways to root an azalea, from air layering, collecting seeds and stem cuttings. He explained about the lighting requirements and humidity needed to get new plants started. There are differences in the native azalea, loose leaves and smaller flowers, and the Japanese azaleas, have more leaves and larger flowers. He stated that azaleas need very little fertilizer and recommended a 12-4-8 formula or a slow release 16-8-12. Make sure you have a good loose soil to root them in and do not use ground dirt. You can use a root hormone if you like, but he doesn't. If you use a root hormone do not double dip your cuttings. Pour some out into another container to guard against spreading disease. This was a very good and informative program.

After a short break Skip recognized our birthdays for April: Teresa Freeman and Wally Walters.
