# PLANTING A FALL VEGETABLE GARDEN

We are blessed by our warm Alabama climate that we can grow vegetables almost year round. Many vegetables we grow in the summer are well adapted for fall harvest and even further into the fall and winter if protected from frost, examples of these are tomatoes and peppers.



Many coolseason vegetables, such as carrots,

broccoli, cauliflower, collards and Brussels sprouts, produce their best flavor and quality when they are maturing during cool weather. In Alabama, the spring temperatures often heat up quickly causing vegetables such as lettuce and spinach to bolt (flower) or develop a bitter flavor. This is why planting these veggies late in the summer or early fall when we are transitioning to cooler temps is more ide- has developed throughout al than in the spring.

Growing a productive fall vegetable garden requires thoughtful planning and good cultural practices. In Alabama, August and Sep-

tember are the ideal months for planting a fall gar-



den. For a more accurate planting schedule, determine the average date of the first killing frost in the fall, and then count backward from the frost date, using the number of days to maturity to determine the best time to plant in your area.

Alabama summers can be hot and dry, and soils may form a hard crust. If you choose to plant your fall veggies from seed you must be careful to keep the soil moist. Incorporating organ-



ic matter into the soil will help add nutrients and also break up the hard crust that the summer, particularly in heavy clay soil. Lettuce and spinach seeds will not germinate if the soil temperature exceeds 85 degrees F so for these you

may need to wait a bit longer before sowing or plant from transplants. Also remember to mulch the garden to moderate moisture levels as September and October are our driest months with very little rainfall.

You can extend your summer vegetable crop and your semi-hardy vegetables on into the fall and winter easily by protecting them from frost.

In Alabama, we often enjoy several weeks of good growing conditions after the first frost. Cover



growing beds, rows or individual plants with burlap or a floating row cover supported by stakes or wire to keep the material from directly touching the plants.

#### Why Baby Carrots Are Killing You

Manufactured baby carrots are a result of taking all the broken and "ugly" big carrots they can't put in the package, grinding them all up, processing them into the "baby" carrots and giving them a bath in chlorine to give them a bright happy orange color.

Inexpensive, lightweight (plastic) pots are needed for container gardens. The end of summer is a great time to pick up bargains at discount and big box stores.


Now is the time that a lot of plants are on clearance. They may look hopeless but still have some life in them.

The Federation of Garden Clubs is requesting that Master Gardeners enter horticulture and/ or container grown plants in the Federation of Garden Clubs Fall Flower Show at the Fair. The Fair will run from October 3-13, 2014. A schedule can be downloaded by accessing the Fair's website at <a href="https://www.alnationalfair.org">www.alnationalfair.org</a> for rules under Competitions tab. The first schedule for bringing entries will be 2:00-4:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 2, 2014 in the Alabama Agricultural Center. You will be asked to have your entries previously identified on an entry tag that will be available at the MG September meeting or through the Fair. Cut horticulture specimens will be accepted Friday, October 3, 2014 from 7:30-9:30 a.m. and again on Wednesday, October 8, 2014.

Entries for the second show will be accepted Wednesday, October 8, 2014, from 7:30-9:30 a.m. The second show is cut specimens only. They run the gamut from cut flowers from annuals, cut flowers from herbaceous perennials, cut flowers from bulbous structures, herbs, cut decorative foliage, flowering vines, arboreal flowering ranches of a wooded shrub or trees, nonflowering or foliage branch from an evergreen tree or shrub, roses, flowering container grown plants (1st show only), foliage container grown

plants (Ist show only) cactus, succulent or bromeliad (Ist show only).

Container grown specimens will be entered only once in the show: Thursday, October 2, 2014 and must remain for the entire show.

Master Gardeners have entered some wonderful specimens in the past. Entering specimens in the Flower Show is a great way for Master Gardeners to highlight their expertise of Horticulture by exhibiting the plants they have grown. There will be class awards of first, second, third and fourth place designations. A specimen winning a Section Award will win a top award which is a ribbon with rosettes.

All of the judges of the flower show are drawn from a list of certified flower show judges or student judges who have met specific requirements for judging. The judges come from all over the State of Alabama and other states as well.

Please join the Montgomery Federation of Garden Clubs in supporting the Flower Show at the Fair. Feel free to call any member listed in the Flower Show Schedule for further information. If you do not know the name of a specimen, someone will assist you in identification prior to the day of entry. All entries will be checked for specific genus, species and cultivar name prior to being placed in the show.

#### **Fruits and Nuts**



New catalogs will be arriving soon.

Start plans for future selection and plantings.

Take soil test for new planting areas.

Fertilize established strawberry plantings.

#### Shrubs



Study landscape to determine plant needs.

Check early varieties of camellias.

You may want to replace those damaged in spring by late freezes.

After fall growth is completed, spray all shrubs with a fungicide.

#### Lawns



Plant seed of winter grasses where situation prevents planting permanent grasses.

Winter seeds will appear soon.

Stop fertilization three weeks before frost.

#### Roses



Protect fall crops of blossoms from aphids and thrips.

Keep plants healthy.

#### **Annuals and Perennials**



Last chance for planting perennials and biennials.

Old clumps of perennials may be divided.

Plant peonies.

#### **Bulbs**



Spring-flowering bulbs may be planted late this month in north Alabama.

Delay planting in south Alabama.

#### Miscellaneous

Clean up infestations of insects on azaleas, camellias, boxwoods, gardenias, hollies, etc.

If oil spray is needed, don't use in freezing weather.

Build compost bin or box; leaves will be falling soon.

Move houseplants indoors.

Plant hardy vegetables and root crops.

#### Garden notes

All of the fothergillas make excellent components in mixed shrub beds or combined with herbaceous perennials and flowering bulbs.

Plant fothergillas near a door, window, walkway or patio where you'll be able to smell the sweetly fragrant flowers in spring.

Fothergillas like a humusy soil, so work in plenty of organic matter before planting.
