ALABAMA GARDENER'S CALENDAR FOR APRIL

FRUITS & NUTS - Season for strawberry planting continues. Start spray program for all fruits. Plant raspberries and blackberries and continue budding apples and peaches.

SHRUBS - Prune spring flowering shrubs after flowering. Fertilize azaleas and camellias. When new growth is half completed, spray all shrubs with a fungicide.

LAWNS - Planting continues. New lawns may need supplementary watering. Also, fertilize at 3- to 6-week intervals. Keep ryegrass cut low, particularly if over planted on Bermuda lawns

ROSES - Watch for insects and diseases. Keep old flower heads removed. Plant containergrown plants from nurseries or garden centers.

ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS - Plant early started annuals or bedding plants from nurseries or garden centers. Divide mums or root cuttings. Dig and divide dahlias.

BULBS - Plant gladiolus, fancy-leaved caladiums, milk and wine lilies, and ginger and gloriosa lilies. Feed bearded iris with super-phosphate and spray for borers. Avoid cutting foliage of narcissus or other bulbs until it has turned brown naturally.

MISCELLANEOUS - Spray camellias, hollies, etc., for scale insects. Carefully water newly planted shrubs and trees. Pinch out tips of new shoots to promote more compact shrubs.

VEGETABLE SEEDS - Plant tender vegetables such as beans, corn, squash, melons, and cucumbers. Plant heat-loving vegetables in lower South Alabama.

VEGETABLE PLANTS - Plant tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, sweet potatoes, and parsley.

For those members who are not familiar with the Program or may just need a little reminder—you may have noticed some members have different colored stars and/or no star attached to their badge, or may even have a different colored badge. The "Reach for Stars" Program was approved and implemented by the State Master Gardener Board of Directors in February 1999. Since the programs' implementation in 1999, we now have 9 recognition categories. Categories are determined based on the total number of volunteer & C.E.U. hours you have reported since becoming a Master Gardener. The category & requirements for each level are:

Bronze Star 100 to 299 hours

Silver Star 300 to 499 hours

Gold Star 500 to 900 hours

Gold Name Badge 1,000 to 1,999 hours

Platinum Name Badge 2,000 to 3,999 hours

Ruby Colored Gemstone 4,000 to 5,999 hours

Emerald Colored Gemstone 6,000 to 7,999 hours

Diamond Colored Gemstone 8,000 to 9,999 hours

Lifetime Membership & Name Badge 10,000 plus hours

First "Don't Bug Me" Webinar Slated for Early February

The inaugural *Don't Bug Me* webinar will provide answers on what works and what doesn't work to control fire ants. Dani Carroll, a regional home grounds agent with the Alabama Cooperative Extension System will host the free webinar on Friday, Feb. 1 at 1:00 pm Central time.

"Do a web search, and you will find lots of sites with home remedies for fire ant control," says Carroll. "They are all over the internet. This webinar will help ordinary people learn what works and what doesn't."

Carroll says that the webinar's expert is Wizzie Brown, a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension specialist working in integrated pest management who will debunk some myths about dealing with fire ants.

Brown says she will begin by explaining basic fire ant biology.

"I plan to talk about "organic" and how it means different things to different people," she says. "Then I will discuss what treatments work and those that do not work. People will learn about less toxic but effective techniques for fire ant management for home landscapes."

Carroll explains that this webinar and all of the *Don't Bug Me* Series webinars are specifically for average people who need answers they can use.

"This first webinar and the rest of the series will give people sound, research-based solutions for pests from some of the top experts in the nation," she says.

The webinars are sponsored by <u>eXtension</u> and the <u>Alabama Cooperative Extension System</u>. They are coordinated by the Imported Fire Ant eXtension Community of Practice.


