ALABAMA GARDENER'S CALENDAR FOR FEBRUARY

FRUITS AND NUTS - Planting season continues for dormant trees. Fertilize fruit trees. Apply half of the fertilizer recommended for grapes now; apply the other half soon after fruit sets. Continue dormant pruning and grafting. Start strawberry plantings.

SHRUBS -Planting season continues. Visit camellia shows to learn of hardy varieties in your area. Graft camellias in Central and South Alabama. Spray all shrubs with a fungicide before new growth starts. Good time to prune all shrubs before new growth starts. Don't prune early-blooming species because flower buds will be removed.

ROSES - Prune hybrid tea roses in South Alabama; delay pruning for a few weeks in North Alabama. Continue planting. **ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS** - Replant early plantings of hardy annuals. Prepare beds for summer annuals.

BULBS - Plant cannas, amaryllis, gladiolus, and zephyranthes in South Alabama; delay planting for a few weeks in North Alabama.

MISCELLANEOUS - Houseplants are beginning to show signs of activity. Fertilize with liquid or soluble fertilizer according to manufacturer's directions. Remember Valentine's Day – why not send roses or a potted plant?

VEGETABLE SEED - Plant some vegetables listed for January in Central Alabama plus collards, salsify, and Swiss chard. Add tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, cauliflower, and Brussels sprouts to cold frames.

VEGETABLE PLANTS - Plant cabbage, onions, lettuce, broccoli, and Brussels sprouts.

Minutes – January 10, 2014

<u>Call to Order</u> – Susan Seng called the meeting to order. After Rita Forrest lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance, Susan welcomed all, recognizing Paul Saeger's wife, Lanelle, as a visitor, and all the new members from the last class. In Mary K. Tomas's absence, Susan gave the Sunshine report. Rhonda Cohen had back surgery in December and is doing well. Carol Beard is unable to make meetings as she is caring for aging parents. Susan also recognized birthdays for January. Dianne McKinnon is taking over as Historian. She is going to digitize all the scrapbooks.

Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented in The Gab. A team audited the books and all looked good. Deb Kattus is our Treasurer for 2014. She reminded us that it is important to fill out and send in an application form with your check every year so information will get to the correct person.

<u>Minutes</u> were passed out at before the meeting. They were accepted.

Committee Reports:

Communication: Jan Rogers explained that with a new treasurer there will be a slightly different system of reports sent to The Gab. It may look different, but the needed information will all be there in a more simplified way. Jan also asked if there were any bounce backs and explained that only members who had paid their dues would receive The Gab. Additionally, it will be posted on the website. She also reminded us that the "official" date for getting things into The Gab is the 20th of each month.

Today she would be posting information about June Mays' talks at the Emmett O'Neal Library in Crestline this Saturday and next.

Jan told us about Rainbow Omega in Eastaboga. This is a community of mentally handicapped persons who run a greenhouse operation, among other things, and could use additional help twice a year. She suggested we visit for lunch and a tour, and then stay to help with a work session in mid-April and mid-December. This December they set out 7,200 poinsettias.

Membership: Cathy Canant reported that SCMG was 13th of the 38 state organizations with 6,768.25 volunteer hours and 594.5 education hours reported, as well as 34,136 contacts made. She said that new levels will be reached when stars are handed out this year. She also explained that 30 minutes should be reported as .50 and not .30. She fixed this in several people's reports.

Projects: Rita had no report on new projects.

Bylaws: Jeanon Massien told us that the last revision of the bylaws was in 2012. She proposed a change that would add a new elected position of Parliamentarian. This would give the voting board an odd number of members so there would not be the possibility of a tie in any vote taken. We were reminded that only elected officers may vote. Appointed committee heads are non-voting positions. Additionally there were a couple more items that will be sent to us via email. Jeanon's announcement serves as the required thirty day notice before the matter will come to a vote at our next meeting, February 14. This went immediately to the Nominations Committee who recommended Sundra Smith to fill the position. This position will commence February 14, 2014 and will be up for regular nomination/election at the end of 2014 with all other elected positions. **Old Business:** The move to make a \$1,000 donation to the Scholarship Fund was tabled until the budget is

completed and presented to the membership.

It was announced that the Board met for three hours and tried to iron out a lot of details so these would not take up as much general meeting time. Everyone on the board values input from all our members.

New Business: The 2014 State Conference will be held April 28 – 30 in Daphne, Alabama. There will be no "host hotel" as the meeting will be held at the Civic Center. Information is ready for the website (AMGAConference.org) and mailing should go out within two weeks.

Announcements: There will be a program on "Hydrangeas" held at Aldridge Gardens January 22nd at 1:00. Master Gardeners are invited.

Susan's poor worms froze in the garage over the cold spell.

Jennifer Gregory will produce a directory for us with Bylaws and contact information.

Programs: Karen Jensen announced that next month's program will be on Honeybees and will be presented by Lloyd Mehaffey. She then introduced our speaker for today's program, Paul Saeger, who gave a wonderful and informative program on "Roses". Following the program Susan thanked several people including our speaker. Tom Harris gave the blessing and a delicious Pot-Luck lunch was enjoyed. There were 42 in attendance.
