Meeting Minutes - 9 January 2015

Susan Seng opened the meeting. After re-electing Sundra Smith Parliamentarian, 2015 officers were installed. Karen Jensen, President; Byron Ford, VP; Deb Kattus, Treasurer; Sundra Smith, Parliamentarian; Randall Robertson, Secretary. New president Jensen presented outgoing President Seng with a lovely rosemary plant and thanked retirees: Rita Forrest, Beth Heerten and Mary K Tomas (not present).

The membership approved the minutes & treasurers report as presented in the GAB.

Announcements: thoughts of sympathy to George Baldwin, whose mother passed away recently, "Get Well Soon" wishes for Heidee Vansant and Michelle Hill, NEW web site for SCMGA (Thanks, VP Byron Ford!) at "scmastergardeners.com". Volunteer hours logging link included, go there to record your hours. Teresa Boody, President of AL Hydrangea Society, alerted members to special Jan workshops. Jennifer Gregory, Events Coordinator, announced an April 14 road trip to Bonnie Plants' farm in Union Springs, AL. Byron Ford noted our February presentation would examine the GMO issue.

Karen Jensen lauded the efforts of the Bill Legg Memorial Committee: Kate Vogel, Myra Healy, Merle Schukoske, and Dot Kachelhofer (photo taken: missing Tommie Harrison, Michelle Hill). Thanks go to Historian Diane McKinnon for the 2014 scrapbook, and certainly to our hospitality helpers, Rhonda Cowen and Angie Ballew.

VP Ford introduced Dale Dickens, our presenter, who has served with the Alabama Forestry Commission since January 24, 2014 as Alabama's Urban Forestry Coordinator. Mr. Dickens is a registered forester in Alabama, and holds both a B.S. in forest management and a M.S. in forest biometrics from Auburn University. He promotes the planning, planting and protection of the valuable trees within our cities and communities, and discussed "Wind Resistant Trees".

Summarizing: No "magic bullet" species, though some better than others. Much of the health and durability of trees echoes the "right plant in right place" mantra familiar to Master Gardeners from their training. Cultural practice has a similar large effect, with design errors to be avoided such as: large maturing trees within 10' of paved areas, single specimen planting vs. grouping, decreased open soil space for roots, roots being cut during construction, and roots being covered with soil to the point no "flare" is visible where main trunk transitions to roots.

Good specimens/varieties characterized by: short/stocky trunks with sparse crowns; extensive, wide root systems; single trunk and shorter side branches with solid branch unions. Examples given: American Holly, Crepe Myrtle, Zelkova Serrata, gingko biloba (male), Bald cypress, Southern magnolia, Live Oak (quercus Virginia), and runners up: Long leaf pine and Sweetgum.

Good cultural practice regardless of species: thin crown allowing air to 'spill' among branches, prune dead limbs, group trees together for mutual support/wind breaking, protect root zone.

If ever trunk damage is noted, have tree inspected by certified arborist.

Blessing by Brenda Fitzgerald, meeting adjourned to Potluck Lunch.

CR's are required to submit an annual report, participate in the ARS' Roses in Review Program, and attend a CR seminar or school every three years. ALABAMA GARDENER'S CALENDAR FOR FEBRUARY

FRUITS AND NUTS - Planting season continues for dormant trees. Fertilize fruit trees. Apply half of the fertilizer recommended for grapes now; apply the other half soon after fruit sets. Continue dormant pruning and grafting. Start strawberry plantings.

SHRUBS -Planting season continues. Visit camellia shows to learn of hardy varieties in your area. Graft camellias in Central and South Alabama. Spray all shrubs with a fungicide before new growth starts. Good time to prune all shrubs before new growth starts. Don't prune early-blooming species because flower buds will be removed.

ROSES - Prune hybrid tea roses in South Alabama; delay pruning for a few weeks in North Alabama. Continue planting. **ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS** - Replant early plantings of hardy annuals. Prepare beds for summer annuals.

BULBS - Plant cannas, amaryllis, gladiolus, and zephyranthes in South Alabama; delay planting for a few weeks in North Alabama.

MISCELLANEOUS - Houseplants are beginning to show signs of activity. Fertilize with liquid or soluble fertilizer according to manufacturer's directions. Remember Valentine's Day – why not send roses or a potted plant?

VEGETABLE SEED - Plant some vegetables listed for January in Central Alabama plus collards, salsify, and Swiss chard. Add tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, cauliflower, and Brussels sprouts to cold frames.

VEGETABLE PLANTS - Plant cabbage, onions, lettuce, broccoli, and Brussels sprouts.
