Tommie Harrison and Merle Schukoske were recognized for each having exceeded one thousand hours total service time since becoming Master Gardeners. Award badges provided at State Conference were awarded by President Forrest at the Shelby Association meeting.
- Committee Reports:

Project: Michelle Hill reports all plant materials obtained through Plant Sales support and purchases have been installed in the project area adjacent the Extension Service building. Materials for the entry portal have been purchased and awaiting fabrication before transport and installation at site entry.

- Communication/announcements:
  - President Forrest thanked those who assisted, on fairly short notice, with preparing the grounds and plantings at the Columbiana Nursing Home before Mother's Day.
  - Oak Mountain Special Needs Fishing Tournament. Diane McKinnon thanked all who volunteered to support this event, and reminds those to be certain to record their service hours!
  - Kate Vogel noted the Cahaba Lilies are a little behind the usual calendar this year, but are still at the best for viewing between Mother's Day and Father's Day. A location of use for viewing can be located in Centerville, AL, leaving Montevallo on AL Hwy 25 south to AL Hwy 85, turning right and crossing the Cahaba River. Soon after the crossing a pull off is located with river access. Dress to enable wading to view the lilies close up, and certainly, don't harvest any lilies! Leave them for all to view.

Pat asked President Forrest to ask for "a couple of volunteers" to help prepare for the plant swap at their home. Also, please remember to bring your bag lunch and folding chair to enjoy the outdoors for the meeting.

• PROGRAM:

Program was presented by Glen Littleton, representing the Alabama Clean Waters Partnership. A short education lecture introducing the organization and its mission preceded the hands-on demonstration of constructing Rain Barrels for water reuse. Those who had expressed an interest in having one could pick one up after the meeting. In greater detail; these were 60 gallon high density nylon barrels previously containing Coca-Cola syrup, with rain entry holes drilled into the tops, covered with netting to reject trash and insects. Hole for a brass outlet hob (faucet) is made and the hob installed. If you have one, be certain to elevate it enough to allow attaching a hose to direct the flow to your plants. #### Redring Milkweed (Asclepias variegata L.) By David Taylor

Redring milkweed is in the Asclepiadaceae (milkweed) family. It is one of about 115 species that occur in the Americas. Most species are tropical or arid land species. The genus name, *Asclepias*, commemorates Asklepios, the Greek god of medicine. Some of the milkweed species have a history of medicinal use including common milkweed, *A. syriaca* (wart removal and lung diseases), and butterfly weed, *A. tuberosa* (also known as "pleurisy root", for pleurisy and other lung disease). The specific epithet, *variegata*, means 'variegated' in reference to the two colors on the flowers.

This species like most milkweeds has a deep root stock that helps the plant survive fire and drought. The plant grows to about 3' tall, sometimes taller, with 4-6 pairs of opposite leaves. Leaves are more or less elliptical and 3-5 inches long by 1-3 inches wide. The underside is lighter in color than the upper side and may have hairs on it. Flowers are waxy and white, frequently with reddish, pinkish, to purplish rings around the middle, hence the common name. Flowers are 0.25-0.35 inches long, and are born in loose to dense hemispherical clusters at the top of the plant. Inflated, but narrow, upright seed pods are usually borne in pairs. The fruits of this plant resemble those of purple milkweed (*A. purpurascens*) and poke milkweed (*A. exaltata*). Broken leaves and stems produce milky latex.

This milkweed like most milkweeds produces copious amounts of nectar and is an important pollinator plant.

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#### ALABAMA GARDENER'S CALENDAR FOR JUNE

**FRUITS AND NUTS**—Layer grapes and continue spray programs. If they are too thick, thin apples and peaches.

**SHRUBS**—Lace bugs may be a problem on azaleas, pyracanthas, dogwoods, cherry laurels, and other shrubs. Water them as needed. Fertilize now. Keep long shoots from developing by pinching out tips. June is a good time to take cuttings from semi-mature wood for rooting.

**LAWNS**—Follow a schedule of fertilization and watering. Lawns should be mowed weekly. Planting may continue if soil is moist. Continue weed spraying if necessary.

**ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS**—Keep old flower heads removed to promote continued flowering. Plant garden mums if they are not already in. For compact mums, keep tips pinched out. Watch for insects and diseases.

**BULBS**—Remove foliage from spring bulbs if it yellow and becoming dry. Watch for aphids and thrips on summer bulbs.

**MISCELLANEOUS**—If scale insects continue on shrubs, use materials other than oils. Set houseplants on porch or outdoors in shade and pay close attention to the need for water. If desired, air layer houseplants.

**VEGETABLE SEED**—Plant beans, field peas, pumpkins, squash, corn, cantaloupes, and watermelons. **VEGETABLE PLANTS**—Plant tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, and sweet potato vine cuttings.
