Program: Wild Flowers, by Rebecca Robertson

Rebecca presented native flowers of the area, organized by the typical environment they are found or prefer. She also included tips to help establish natives you may try to bring in. Example, for an item in dry shade, the plant will require daily water for the first week, every other day in the 2nd week. Augment water each subsequent week less than 1" of rainfall is received throughout the next year. After that time you may consider the plant as established in that site.

Shelby County MG's enjoyed attending the AMGA Fall Seminar

Birmingham Botanical Gardens shares ways to conserve water while keeping your lawn healthy BIRMINGHAM, AL (WBRC) -

With little rain in over a month and not much expected in the weeks to come, the Birmingham Water Works Board is <u>asking its cus</u>tomers to voluntarily conserve water.

But how can you do that and still keep your landscape looking healthy?

James Horton, director of the Birmingham Botanical Gardens, gave three main tips to follow.

First, if you must water your lawn, early morning is the best time to do so. Start around 4 a.m. and go no later than 10 a.m.

Another idea, he says, is to make sure your flower and tree beds have mulch, at least two to four inches of something like pine bark or pine straw.

"It keeps the moisture in the soil and it's going to evaporate," Horton explained. "But if you mulch it, so much more is saved for the plant to use."

He also said raising the mowing height of your grass can help, too.

"If you raise your mowing height, you're going to be mowing less. The lawn can still look good. And if your lawn is under drought conditions right now, do not mow at all. That's only going to increase the stress on the grass," he said.

Conserving water doesn't only apply to agriculture.

There are also things you can also do inside of your home to help like taking shorter showers or not running your clothes or dish washer until they are fully loaded.

ALABAMA GARDENER'S CALENDAR FOR OCTOBER

Fruits and Nuts—Planting season for strawberries starts in south Alabama. Clean up orchard area. Remove broken limbs, old fruit, and debris from orchard floor. Shrubs—Shrub plantings can be made. Water when needed. Note varieties of camellias in bloom. Start mulching all shrubs that do not have a mulch. Lawns—Continue to mow lawns until no new growth is noticeable. Roses—Continue insect and disease control practices. New rose catalogs will be coming in. Study closely; add some new varieties to your list. Annuals and Perennials—Visit flower shows and gardens. List desirable varieties of mums. Clean up flower beds immediately after first killing frost. Bulbs—Plant tulips, hyacinths, daffodils, crocuses, Dutch irises, anemones, and ranunculus's. Watch planting depth. Dig caladiums; clean and store in warm place. Miscellaneous—Renew mulch around shrubs and rose beds. Loosen mulches that have packed down. Spray with oils before freezing weather to kill scale, mites, etc. Remove all dead stems and trash from flower beds. Transplant into small pots any cuttings taken earlier.

Vegetable Seed—Plant turnips, mustard, kale, rape, spinach, and onion sets.
