- Come to Mobile for the March 30th, Annual AMGA Conference. Rather, come to Mobile early and visit the stunning Providence Foundation Festival of Flowers March 26-29.
- The conference begins Monday, March 30th, with three breakout sessions followed by our noon keynote speaker, Jim Martin, a veteran horticulturist, director of programs for the Charleston Parks Conservancy in South Carolina.
- The conference theme is *Gardening with 20/20 Vision*, so Jim will share his vision in "Gardening Future Forward." The new direction he is following is characterized by his organization, Compost in My Shoe, that began as a blog post about his garden and has grown into an enterprise in which he sells his garden produce weekly to faithful subscribers in a co-op. Jim's continuing interests are leading him into design, and growth of ornamentals. Martin's breakout session following his keynote address is titled "Star-Studded Floral Design Using Creative Structures, Grocery Store Fare, and Your Backyard."

- Another break-out session sharing a vision for gardening's future will be Bobby Green of Fairhope, AL, discussing the heat-tolerant native varieties growing on the Gulf Coastal Plain. Sarah Skelly, OD, will recommend strategies to care for our health and general well-being as gardeners. Evie Pankok of Florida will teach us recycling in our gardens, and Bill Finch shares his newest book, Light in the Long Leaf.
- Our Tuesday evening banquet speaker is storyteller and humorist Dolores Hydock who will share two gardening tales: "Becoming Mrs. Nash" and "Western Civilization." A film festival featuring environmental reporter, Ben Raines is scheduled, as well as the AMGA business meeting that will include electing new officers and the announcement of awards. These are just a few of the 18 speakers across 22 sessions offered.

SWEET HOT PICKLES

from the kitchen of Kate Vogel, Master Gardener




INGREDIENTS:

- 1 (46-ounce) jar whole dill pickles, drained
- 2 whole jalapeño peppers or more, to taste
- 11/2 cups sugar
 - 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar

DIRECTIONS:


- 1. Cut pickles into 1/4-inch thick slices.
- 2. Make 4 lengthwise slits in each jalapeño pepper, keeping stem end intact.
- 3. Layer pickle slices alternately with peppers in pickle jar.
- 4. Gradually add sugar, tapping bottom of jar gently on a flat surface to allow sugar to settle in jar.
- 5. Add vinegar.
- 6. Cover with lid, and let stand at room temperature 1 hour, shaking jar occasionally.
- 7. Chill 8 hours, shaking jar occasionally to ensure even pepper heat distribution.
- 8. Store in refrigerator.

ALABAMA GARDENERS' CALENDAR FOR FEBRUARY

Fruits and Nuts—Planting season continues for dormant trees. Fertilize fruit trees. Apply half of the fertilizer recommended for grapes now; apply the other half soon after fruit sets. Continue dormant pruning and grafting. Start strawberry plantings.

Shrubs—Planting season continues. Visit camellia shows to learn of hardy varieties in your area. Graft camellias in central and south Alabama. Spray all shrubs with a fungicide before new growth starts. Good time to prune all shrubs before new growth starts. Don't prune early-blooming species because flower buds will be removed.

Roses—Prune hybrid tea roses in south Alabama; delay pruning for a few weeks in north Alabama. Continue planting.

Annuals and Perennials—Replant early plantings of hardy annuals. Prepare beds for summer annuals.

Bulbs—Plant cannas, amaryllis, gladiolus, and zephyranthes in south Alabama; delay planting for a few weeks in north Alabama.

Miscellaneous—Houseplants are beginning to show signs of activity. Fertilize with liquid or soluble fertilizer according to manufacturer's directions. Remember Valentine's Day. Why not send roses or a potted plant?

Vegetable Seed—Plant some vegetables listed for January in central Alabama plus collards, salsify, and Swiss chard. Add tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, cauliflower, and Brussels sprouts to cold frames.

Vegetable Plants—Plant cabbage, onions, lettuce, broccoli, and Brussels sprouts.
