A survey to explore the wishes of the Association's members was collected in January. Vice President Elizabeth York will provide the details at the February Business Meeting. I do want to refer us all back to "The AMGA Volunteer Training Handbook. The first pages and the first chapter give detailed information on "Understanding the Program", "Our Purpose, Objectives, and Relationships", and "Community Volunteer Projects". I have found myself re-reading as each question comes up. Please review the chapter. It states we are an educational arm of Extension. MGs should evaluate the educational usefulness of the project and determine if the organization has enough time to devote to it. Our fundraising should support Extension and we should avoid funding beautification projects unless they are for county Extension offices or places MGs meet frequently. A few meetings back we discussed Projects in several business meetings. These discussions included:

- 1. Alabama Master Gardener Program Volunteer Request Form and asked that if members knew of a project needing member volunteers, please use this form. (Chapter 1 appendix 1.D)
- Leadership is needed for projects, ownership of projects, and willingness of membership volunteers to serve with the project's committee.

The handbook uses the word sanctioned. Seed to Table Community Garden is our only sanctioned project (prior to Covid Era and going back over ten years). I used the word owned, or official and should have said sanctioned. This project serves our entire county, meets our Extension Mission of educational, benefits the GMGM initiative, was awarded money from the state association project funding committee last year and received the highest number of Survey Votes to continue. This was providing we improve the maintenance plan. This does not mean we should not participate in volunteer opportunities and report hours while using our MG certification to advise or participate in other projects. It does not mean that we cannot fairly consider other project requests. I hope this clarifies.

Iartha Stewart's CARROT CAKE From the Kitchen of: Heidee Vansant, Shelby County Master Gardener

Ingredients:

- 2½ cups all-purpose flour, plus more for pans
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 34 teaspoon coarse salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 3 sticks (12 ounces) unsalted butter, room temperature, plus more for pans
- 1 cup packed light-brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- ½ cup water
- 1 pound carrots (8 to 10 medium carrots), peeled and shredded on a box grater or in a food processor (about 2³/₄ cups)

2 cups toasted pecans (1 cup finely chopped for batter, 1 cup coarsely chopped for decorating sides of cake)

Directions:

- Preheat oven to 350° F. Butter three 9-inch round cake pans. Line bottoms with parchment paper, and butter parchment. Dust with 1. flour, tapping out excess. Whisk together flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, salt, ginger, and nutmeg
- Beat butter and sugars with a mixer on medium speed until pale and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat 3 minutes. Add vanilla, water, and carrots. Beat until well combined, about 2 minutes. Reduce speed to low, and add flour mixture, then finely chopped pecans.
- Using a serrated knife, trim rounded top of 2 cakes. Place one trimmed cake, cut side up, on a serving platter. Spread 1 cup frosting over cake. Top with second trimmed cake, cut side down. Spread 1 cup frosting over cake. Top with remaining cake. Spread 3 remaining frosting over top and sides. Gently press coarsely chopped pecans onto sides of cake. Refrigerate 1 hour before serving.

Easy Cream Cheese Frosting Ingredients:

- 16 ounces cream cheese, room temperature
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 2 sticks (16 tablespoons) unsalted butter, cut into small pieces and brought to room temperature
- 2 pounds confectioners' sugar, sifted

- Beat cream cheese and vanilla with a mixer on medium speed until creamy. Gradually add butter, beating until incorporated after each addition.
- Reduce speed to low. Gradually add confectioners' sugar, and beat until fluffy and smooth.

ALABAMA GARDENERS' CALENDAR FOR FEBRUARY

FRUITS AND NUTS—Planting season continues for dormant trees. Fertilize fruit trees. Apply half of the fertilizer recommended for grapes now; apply the other half soon after fruit sets. Continue dormant pruning and grafting. Start strawberry plantings. **SHRUBS**—Planting season continues. Visit camellia shows to learn of hardy varieties in your area. Graft camellias in Central and South Alabama. Spray all shrubs with a fungicide before new growth starts. Good time to prune all shrubs before new growth starts. Don't prune early-blooming species because flower buds will be removed. **ROSES**—Prune hybrid tea roses in South Alabama; delay pruning for a few weeks in North Alabama. Continue planting.

ANNUALS AND PERENNIALS—Replant early plantings of hardy annuals. Prepare beds for summer annuals.

BULBS—Plant cannas, amaryllis, gladiolus, and zephyranthes in South Alabama; delay planting for a few weeks in North Alabama.

MISCELLANEOUS—Houseplants are beginning to show signs of activity. Fertilize with liquid or soluble fertilizer according to manufacturer's directions. Remember Valentine's Day – why not send roses or a potted plant?

VEGETABLE SEED—Plant some vegetables listed for January in Central Alabama plus collards, salsify, and Swiss chard. Add tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, cauliflower, and Brussels sprouts to cold frames.

VEGETABLE PLANTS—Plant cabbage, onions, lettuce, broccoli, and Brussels sprouts.
