The Spigelia Marilandica is a perennial wildflower in the Loganiaceae Family that is used as an ornamental plant. It flowers in June and tends to be found in low moist woods, ravines or streambanks in both partial and full shade. The unusual blooms are trumpet shaped with a red exterior and a unique flare at the top that forms a yellow star shape.

Recipe of the month from Margaret Copeland



Gaga's Pound Cake (Margaret's children called Margaret's mother Gaga)

Ingredients:

3 cups sugar 3 sticks salted butter 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese 3 cups plain flour 2 tsp. baking powder 6 eggs 2 tsp. almond flavoring

Directions:

Beat sugar and butter until light and fluffy; then, beat in cream cheese. Sift flour and baking powder in separate bowl. Alternate adding flour and eggs to the batter, beginning with flour. Then beat in almond flavoring. Bake in prepared tube pan at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 20 minutes. (Make sure to spray the pan thoroughly with Pam before baking.) Let cool and remove from pan. Serve with strawberries and whipped cream or vanilla ice cream.
