Morris Elementary

Our team of MGNA volunteers continues to meet weekly with a class of 27 fourth graders at Morris Elementary. The class is divided into four teams.

Activities are varied and have included investigating and comparing soils, proper watering, weed identification, and checking for diseases and insects. Students learned the needs of plants through the acronym PLANT-Place, Light, Air, Nutrients, Thirst (water). Students harvested sweet potatoes that had been planted in May by last year's students and planted assorted carrot and radish seeds into the raised beds.

After learning the basic parts of a flower, students dissected flowers to discover what was inside. They have also made bird feeders using paper towel rolls peanut butter and wild bird seed. Common seed dispersal methods were introduced to the students and they participated in demonstrations of these methods and recorded weekly changes in their garden journals. Students were introduced to comparison between dicots and monocots, and various propagation methods were discussed and demonstrated using plants donated by MGNA members.

The groups learned that a variety of plants have been used for medicinal purposes for thousands of years, and they made a salve that can be used to treat wounds. They have also learned how plants are used for coloring fabrics using plants such as beets and avocado.

Demonstrations during the seminar included use of exclusion pest cloths, soil sterilization, proper sanitation practices, and small-space and square-foot gardening. The MGNA Landscape Team, after 18 months of preparation, will offer our new 6-week **Design Your Home Landscape Course** beginning January 31. Team members are Janet Acosta, Janet Boothe, Gigi Bullman, Helen Carr, Rita Icenogle, Suzanne Kirkhuff, Karen Kirk-Williams, Sandra Smith, Eileen Tully, and Carol Umstaedter. Our new Regional Extension Agent, Lilly Oaks, will also teach a class.

Our DYHL course is based on classes Karen started as a Master Gardener at Northwest Florida State College, which quickly became their most popular adult class. Each class features a lecture combined with individual student/MG consultations. \$60 includes a 100 page handbook and a personalized list of recommended plants. The class size is limited.



This outreach project is ideal for homeowners who wish to learn how to design their own landscape using an easy-to-follow process. We provide simple design instruction and focus on proper plant selection, planting, and maintenance using ACES researchbased plant lists and guidance.

Our goal is to help participants create a pleasing landscape that offers enjoyment and pride of ownership. We stress "right plant, right place" using sustainable gardening practices so that the use of pesticides, irrigation, and maintenance is minimized.
