It was my good fortune to be in the Class of 2012 for many reasons, but one very good reason was sharing that class with Peggy Wright, this month's Master Gardener of the Month. It doesn't take long for those meeting Peggy to recognize her many talents and abilities, and it is to the Class of 2012's credit that we voted her our Class Representative.

Each month, I start my MGOM brainstorming session for this article by asking myself, "What are the things I first noticed about

?" When I asked myself that question about Peggy, it was a bit of an overload because there are so many things about Peggy that stand out. But I made myself filter through things like this: 1) She insists she is older than I am so why does she look ten years younger? 2) How does she always seem so unruffled, so in command? 3) Why do her bows look so much better than mine ever do, no matter how often she shows me how to do them? And finally, I settled on what is the undeniable thing about Peggy that I first noticed: Peggy Wright is smart.

And it is that intellect that gives her that unruffled confidence, that always -in-command demeanor, that keeps her young and vibrant, and that enables her to do almost everything better, even making bows. I credit the MGOM committee for recognizing what Peggy has contributed recently in her work as a mentor for this Intern Class, bringing food, attending classes, leading bow-making workshops, and all of the other things she has been involved in this fall with Greenery Sale.
